LANDER CHOOSES NEW DEAN

by Jeff Lagrone; originally published Apr 04, 2020 Lander University's College of Arts and Humanities has a new dean: Dr. Mark Rollins, the current dean of the Humanities Division at Young Harris College.

"I am thrilled to be joining the team at Lander University and to help continue the impressive momentum the university has achieved. It's exciting to become a part of a vibrant and growing institution," he said.

A professor of English, Rollins's primary area of interest is 19th century, 20th century and contemporary British literature and culture. He has taught at Young Harris since 2004, the year in which he was awarded a Ph.D. by the University of Georgia.

Rollins praised Lander's senior leadership for their work in developing pre-professional programs, while maintaining a firm grounding in the liberal arts.

"I look forward to finding additional ways to develop in-demand courses and programs in the College of Arts and Humanities," he said.

Consulting faculty, staff and students about their vision for the college and its programs will be the first thing he does when he starts work on July 1.

"I plan to be a faculty-friendly dean who works collaboratively to manage change and seek improvements," he said.

The College of Arts and Humanities reaches every student at the university through the general education core curriculum, and a sizeable percentage of students major or minor in one of its programs.

"I want their experience in our courses to be the best that it can be," he said.

Rollins's wife, Wendy, will continue her work as an associate professor of English at the University of North Georgia, in Dahlonega. The couple have a 13-year-old son, Quentin.

Dr. Scott Jones, provost and executive vice president for Academic Affairs, welcomed Rollins to Lander.

"Dr. Rollins has a record as an effective leader. In his previous institution, he was repeatedly placed in charge of crucial projects and initiatives, leading effectively by building consensus. As Lander University continues to work to best position itself for the future, his leadership and abilities will prove invaluable," he said.


SARAH WILLIAMS-SHEALY

them achieve their own personal goals. Part of that is creating a space in my classroom where minority students are heard and taught in a way that works for them. In my classroom, the inclusion of different cultures and experience kind of happens naturally. Being an English teacher, I am allowed a little bit of freedom in the types of books I teach to my students. I always try to select books that show main characters from different cultures and perspectives. Additionally, on a more personal level, I make it a point to develop a relationship with each of my students so that they will be more willing to hear and listen to what I have to say. I think it's very important that a student is able to trust their teacher. If a student is willing to trust you, they are going to be willing to learn from you.

What did you learn as an LU English, Secondary Education major that is now valuable in your job?

I learned several concepts at Lander that I now use almost daily in my career in education. I learned from Dr. Willis and Dr. Barnette that it is okay to show students who you really are. Meaning, I try not to hide my quirks from my students. It helps students realize that I am a real person just like them. I learned from Dr. Anderson how to conduct lessons day to day. He showed me that if I try to lecture everyday, students wouldn't respond well it. Additionally, he taught me to allow space for my students to practice. He said "You shouldn't be doing all the work, the students have to be able to do the work too". This advice led me to be able to create a bit of a timeline that every lesson should follow and has made my life as a teacher that much easier.

What do you miss most about Lander University?

I really miss the community at Lander. I'll admit, I didn't always appreciate what Lander was giving me while I attended school there, but since leaving, I have found that I miss the feelings I had as I would walk across campus to class or to the Caf or to hang out with friends.

What's the most noteworthy experience you had since graduation?

I've encountered a number of noteworthy experiences since I graduated in 2016, but I think the biggest event was getting engaged to the love of my life, Amanda back in April.

2020 has been a strange year. Upon reflection, what words of wisdom or advice would you share with current students, future teachers, or us all?



NEW VOICES FROM THEN TO NOW

WHAT IS NEW VOICES? by Drs. Jeffrey Baggett and Misty Jameson

<u>New Voices</u> is the only outlet on campus that students have for showcasing both writing and art. As such, it serves a vital function in the Lander community as a testament to our students' creativity and talent and as a recruitment tool to prospective students. It also allows our student editors to have important hands-on experience working for this type of publication.



New Voices began in 1986 and, in the 2014 edition, was expanded beyond nonfiction and academic essays to include fiction, poetry, and visual art. Each year, between two and four Lander students serve on the Student Editorial Board; it is their job to work with the Faculty Advisors to select works for publication and awards, edit written pieces, and help arrange the final published version of New Voices. While we continue to maintain a small print run, we have expanded our range of readers by going online. Many of our writers and editors of New Voices have gone on to be published writers, professional editors, and award winners. 2015 alumnus, Robby Maynor, has published several short stories, was recognized by the South Carolina Academy of Authors, and in 2018 won the Larry Brown Short Story Award. We plan to improve and expand New Voices so that it will continue to provide a springboard for emerging writers and artists and a valuable training ground for students pursuing fields in publishing and editing. The 2021 edition of New Voices will also be a part of Lander University's Race and Identity Dialogue taking place this fall; we will be issuing a special call-for-submissions in the spring and, ultimately, selecting/publishing works that focus on race and identity.

This year's New Voices is different from any of the previous editions. This year, because of the Coronavirus, or COVID-19, outbreak, people were sent off campus as it closed for the rest of the term. So, instead of meeting in person, the editors had to get creative. There were emails sent back and forth between the Student Editorial Board and Faculty Sponsors and a rubric to fill out with all of our comments. One of the things I did, as one of the editors, was to send an email to the author of the piece, and we created a Google Doc that we shared. This allowed both of us to make comments and have the author review them before we made our final edits.

Even though these changes were unexpected, the awards and honors associated with New Voices were still given as normal. When asked about her reaction to her piece winning, Jordan expressed, "I was surprised and honored that the story was chosen as the winning story. I had written it for my Writing Fiction class, and so it went through a couple of changes before it made it to New Voices. I just hope the readers enjoy the story."
